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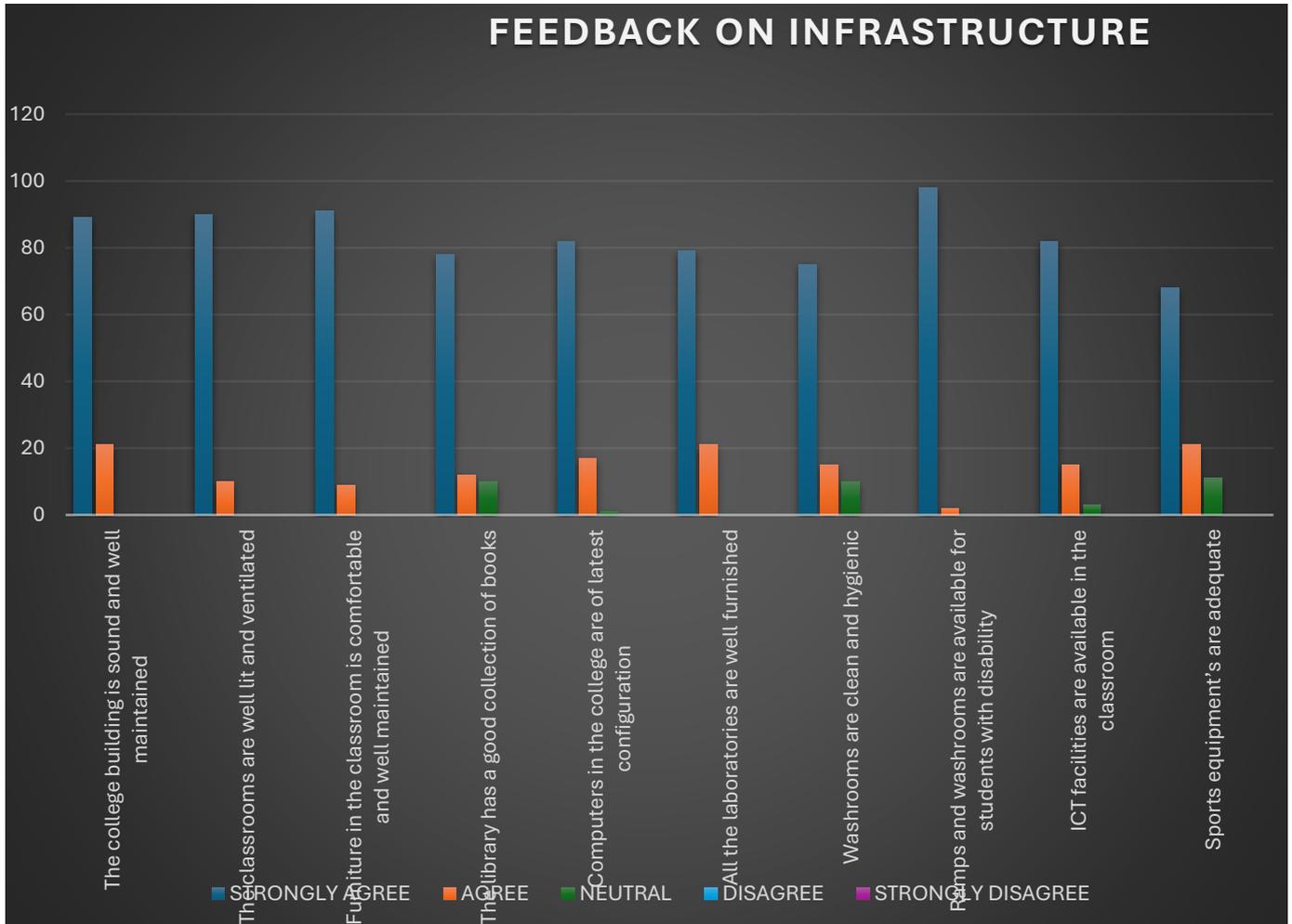

### 4. Lowest Satisfaction:

The statement "Sports equipment is well maintained" appears to have the lowest "Strongly Agree" responses and relatively higher disagreement levels compared to other categories.

### 5. Negligible Strong Disagreement:

The purple bars (Strongly Disagree) are minimal or nearly absent in all categories, which shows very few students expressed strong dissatisfaction.

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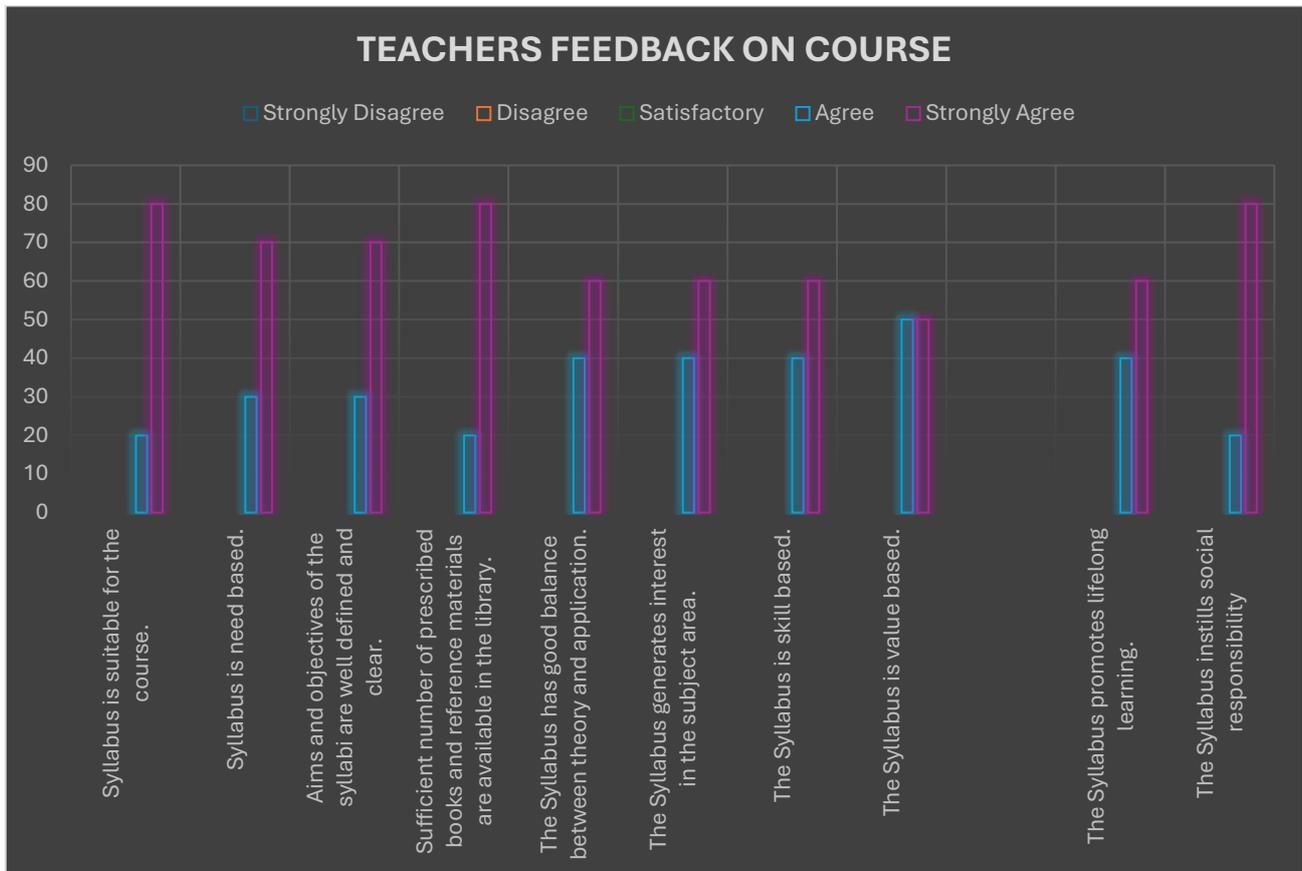

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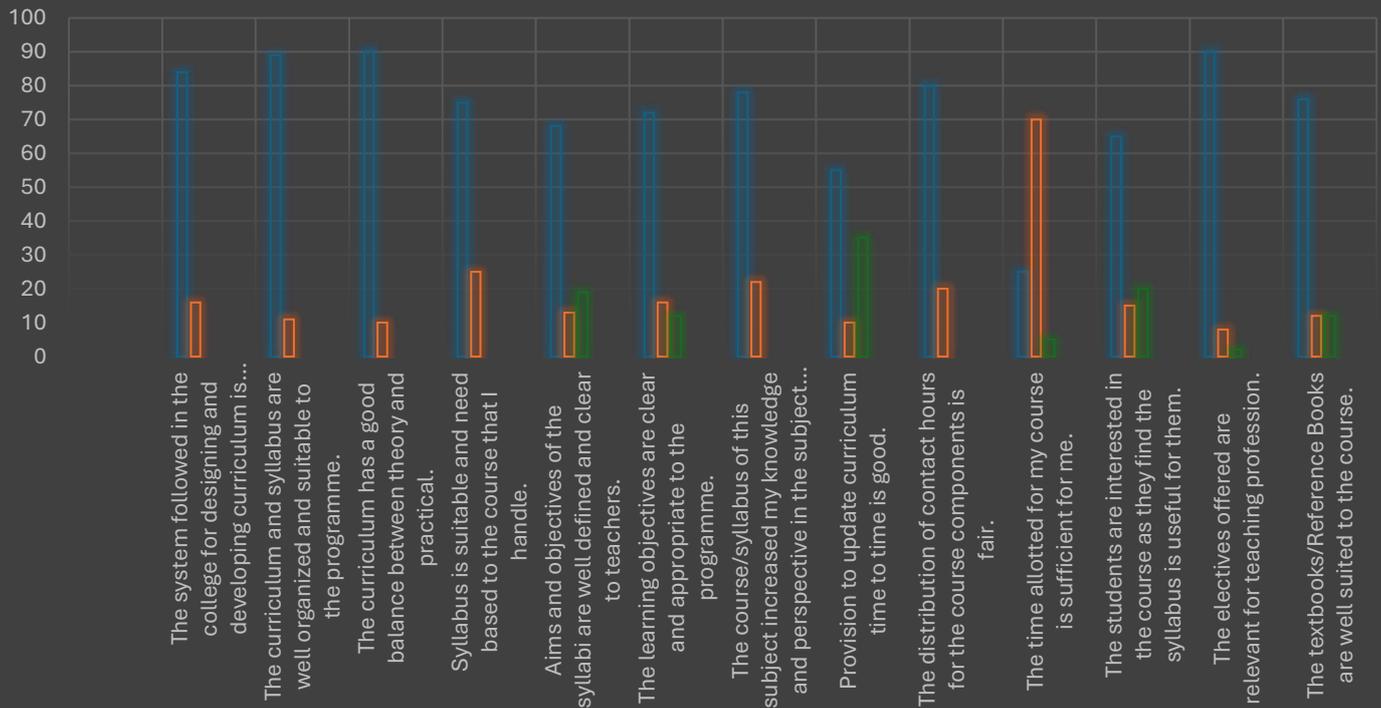

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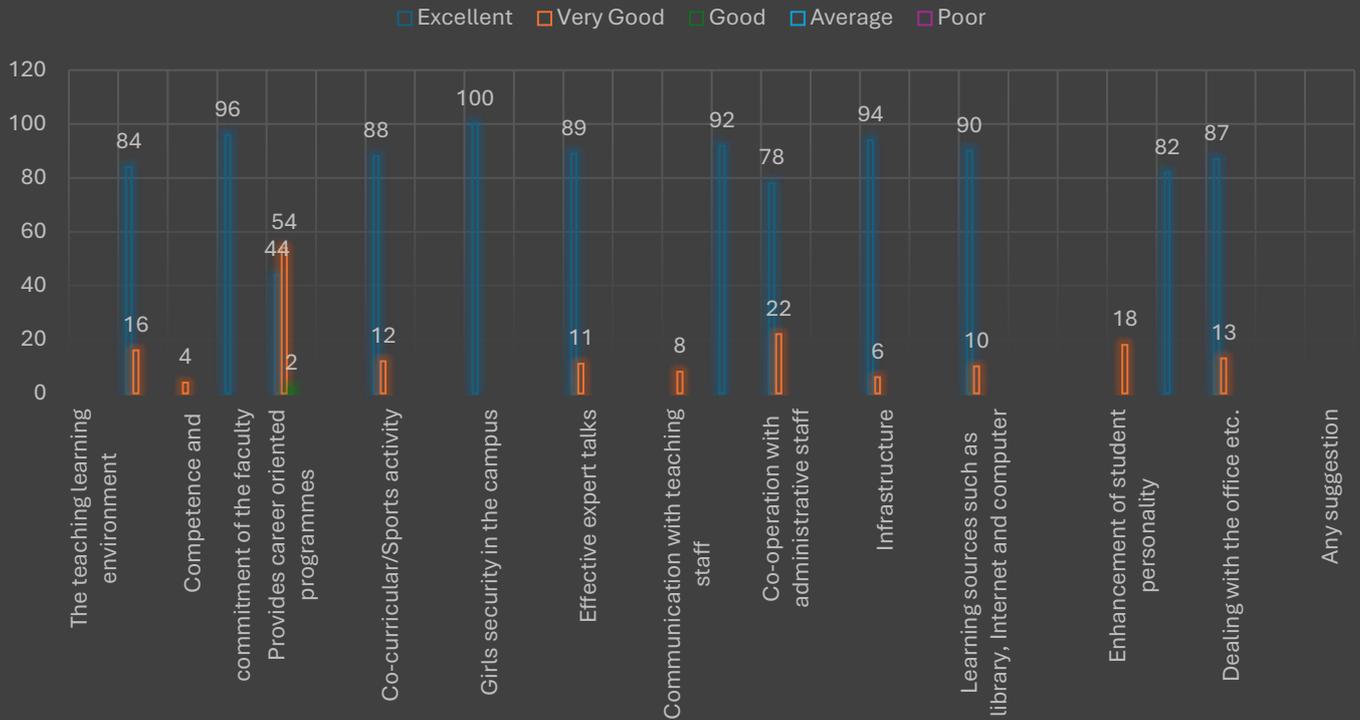

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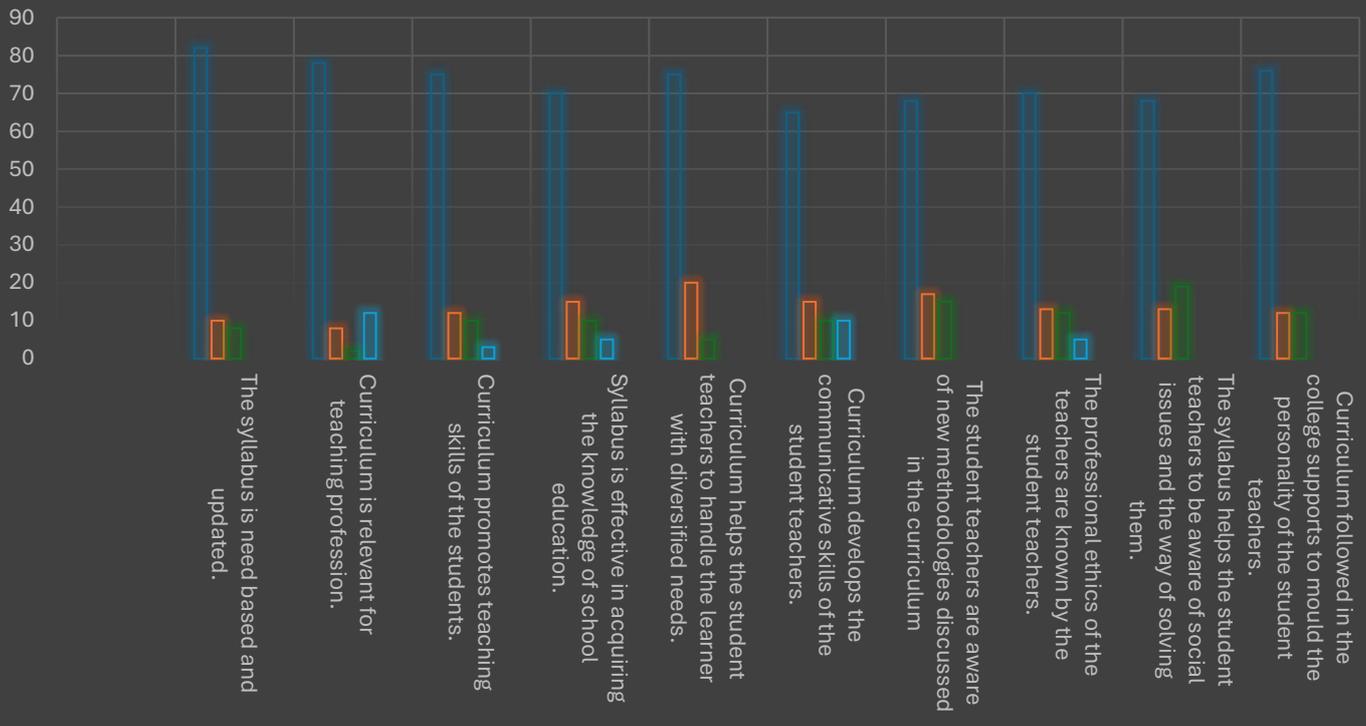

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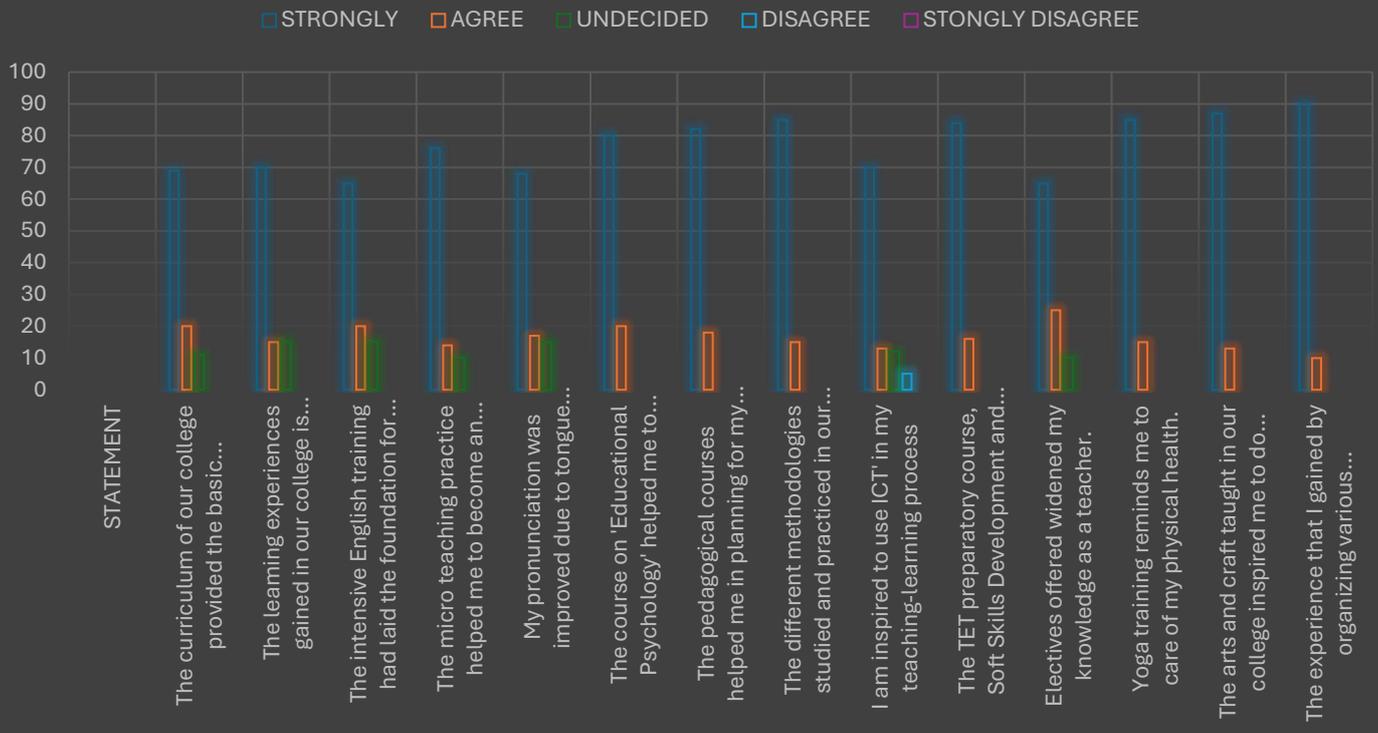

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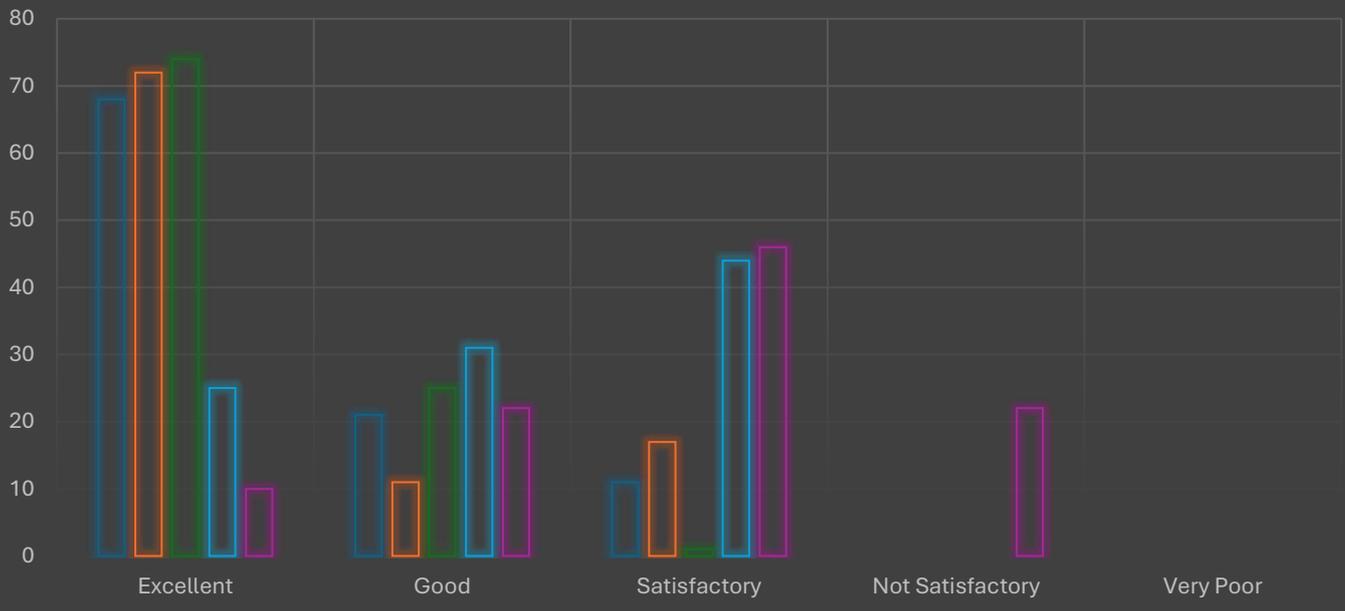
